May Program -- a Sunday afternoon in Brownsburg

"Stones and their Stories: A Stroll through New Providence Cemetery"

Visit the Civil War exhibit in the Brownsburg Museum, followed by a dessert social and a talk by Dr. Cash Koeniger about the people who attended New Providence Church in the 18th and 19th centuries, whose tombs and monuments now surround the church.

On Sunday evening, May 18th, at 6:00 p.m., Dr. Cash Koeniger, retired VMI history professor, long-time resident of the Brownsburg area, and member of New Providence Church, will present an illustrated lecture, "The Stones and their Stories: A Stroll through New Providence Cemetery." He will focus on some of the more interesting residents of the Brownsburg community who found their final resting places in the church graveyard. Koeniger has scoured both photographic and documentary archives to ferret out these tales of life in the 18th and 19th centuries. At the conclusion of his

talk, listeners are invited to stroll on their own through the cemetery, many of whose occupants will have been made familiar to us during Dr. Koeniger's presentation.

A letter from the Executive Director

After an earlier prompt to think on the Roads around us, it seems now timely to lend a thought to Bridges. Rockbridge County, of course, is named for one of the most famous bridges in our country. And at the time our county was formed, Natural Bridge was not only the most noted of American bridges and natural wonders throughout a newly emergent nation, but internationally renowned, as well: adorning the wallpaper of 19th century Parisians, and exciting the imaginations of Romantic poets and painters on both sides of the Atlantic.

As you know from recent local and national accounts, Natural Bridge remains at the center of some extraordinary efforts in historic preservation and natural conservation. With a lasting vision, and local partnerships, the newly formed Virginia Conservation Legacy Fund has stepped in to purchase and manage the Bridge and its surrounding property; to establish conservation easements and transition the over 1,500 forested acres into a State Park over the next few years; and to renovate the historic Natural Bridge Hotel and update associated facilities. As it protects this unique natural legacy, VCLF will also revitalize its attraction to visitors and tourists, a history at least as old as the ticket office and guest house Thomas Jefferson built on site, shortly after purchasing the patent from King George III in 1774 for 20 shillings. With other local organizations (Friends of the Natural Bridge, Rockbridge Area Conservation Council, and RHS among others), these forward looking commitments, coupled with such long and lived legacies bring both promise and excitement to our county and region as a whole. Among many other things, those efforts, and the monument itself, stand as durable bridges between our locally distinctive history, and the deep time of natural history.

At the Rockbridge Historical Society, we are in a key position to emphasize the many different ways in which History functions as a Bridge between the Past and the Present. No mere cliché, bridges both stretch and inspire, while enabling new travel, exchange, and conversation. Traditionally, the arc of history has rested on the long-established pillars of core disciplines: political and military histories; economic and social histories; and, of particular importance to our local mission at RHS, the keystones of family histories. Looking through our 75 years of programs and published <u>Proceedings</u> – leading records, themselves, among historical societies in the Commonwealth – those approaches have remained central to our attentions, and have enjoyed welcome and sustained audience.

In some of our most recent programming and partnerships, we've also worked to foreground some of the less chronicled angles of Rockbridge lives, with lenses on Natural History and Art History. With the coming arrival of an interactive "Discovery Trunk" -- a historic reproduction of the trunk, tools, and specimens carried by the Corps of Discovery -- we continue to showcase the histories of the Lewis and Clark expedition (not least as they crossed our namesake Bridge when trafficking Rockbridge County on their return). And over the sustained reach of our last three meetings, we've welcomed the opportunity to highlight the color and connections between four internationally recognized artists, whose lives intersected through and beyond their homes in Rockbridge. In the process, we've also been glad to welcome a number of new guests to the RHS fold from the area's rich artistic circles. In our attempts to remain broadly representative, RHS will continue to reach for demographic diversity within our neighborly orbits, and to engage a range of imaginative approaches to our many and memorable bridges to the past.

Stay tuned for more on RHS' journeys in the months ahead: a June 30 Field Trip for a special tour the Daura Gallery in Lynchburg (courtesy its Director/last RHS speaker); an entertaining July stroll down Lexington's Main Street to survey the growing Historic Pavers Project ('The Righteous and Rascals of Rockbridge'); and, come our Anniversary Gala on November 17, a celebration and retrospective on the 75 years of service and leadership that RHS has brought to the full span of Rockbridge County. Thank you as ever for your range of support, and the community bridges you help us to build, and sustain.

RHS acquires Lewis and Clark "Discovery Trunk"

Thanks to RHS leadership in linking Rockbridge County to the Lewis and Clark National Historic Trail, the Lewis and Clark Trust recently offered us an opportunity to acquire a historically authentic Discovery Trunk.

Handcrafted by John Fisher, a historian, scientist, and educator based in Idaho, this hands-on ensemble faithfully reproduces the trunk itself, period tools, instruments, and medicines, as well as the kinds of flora, fauna, and mineral specimens carried home by the Corps of Discovery.

Support from a group of RHS donors has enabled us to purchase one of these rare trunks for our permanent collection. This portable, interactive resource will also allow us to carry these "tools of memory" into local schools and to other RHS educational programs.
